### Your sectors

What sectors of Law are you interested in? Whether this is medical negligence, intellectual property, criminal or trust law you need to have the cases to prove this interest. It's a good idea to make sure that the cases you can talk about are rather recent ones i.e. a year old at max. It shows you are keeping on top of what is happening in your area of interest and simultaneously, while researching these cases, you will learn more about how these areas of law works, what names that keep coming up in cases, and how the world is impact thusly from these decisions or judgements being made.

When you're making your applications it's probably a good idea to only write about cases that specific employer is responsible for but it's still a good idea to have a general understanding of how your sector is doing in order to demonstrate your passion during interviews etc

### Your Firms/Chambers

What cases have your legal idols worked on recently? Do these firms or chambers have a good relationship with their clients i.e. are they constantly coming back to them and them alone? While, again, it is good to have an arsenal with recent cases in to show you keep up to date with what your firm/chambers are doing having some older ones in there won't hurt, especially if they were incredibly significant.

You can use their own websites, little law, financial times and legal cheek to keep up to date!

### What the Government is up to

This might seem a bit of an odd one but it's very good to keep up to date with what consultations and policy the government is running, bills that are going through parliament etc. Why? Well by doing this you can make predictions of how your sector is going to be affected and what work

firms/chambers in this sector are potentially going to have to do which is mighty impressive in an interview.

You can get a (free) email subscription which informs you of any updates on consultations/ policy (you can set your own preferences on how often you receive these emails). Just search up Government Policy papers and consultations, click on top link, scroll to the near bottom of the page where it says 'get emails' and go from there!
